Pastor's Perspective

What an incredible month! In fact, what an incredible season we find ourselves in as a church. To God be all the glory! A common point of discussion I find myself using frequently has to do with not just getting rid of unhealthy things but planting something healthy in its place. Here's what I mean. Imagine an unhealthy plant or a big weed coming out of the ground. We're likely aware that if we were to snip off the weed at the surface it would simply grow back in a short time. To be rid of it, we need to pull it out by the roots. It's likely that if it's pulled out by the roots there would be a cavity in the now disrupted soil where the roots once were. Being rid of something unhealthy is good, but planting something healthy in its place is far better. This is the great picture we're experiencing individually and corporately.

God is not only removing unhealthy ways of thinking and living in our midst but within the "disrupted soil" of our lives He's now planting a healthy seed in its place. That healthy seed is now put in a good place and can begin to germinate and grow into something beautiful and fruitful. A place that once produced something unhealthy is now producing something healthy. When the children of Israel got delivered from Egyptian captivity, it wasn't so they could just wander the desert free. The goal was to get them to the Promised Land. God's intentions weren't just to get them out of something bad but to get them into something good. This same truth fits with this personalized and corporate reality of where we are as a church. I celebrate what God is pulling out by the root but even more, so I rejoice in what He is planting. He's planting something far more beautiful. I've seen lots of landscapes free of weeds and it's very pretty. But we're not called to look pretty. We're called to Culture Like Christ with Jesus as our model. We're called to bear fruit; to make disciples and to live as Jesus did. John.15:16 NASB "You did not choose Me but I chose you, and appointed you that you would go and bear fruit, and that your fruit would remain... Ask the Lord what weeds are still present in your life. Through prayer, ask God to begin pulling those things out by the root. This is deliverance. Getting free from unhealthy things. Then, ask the Lord, by the power of the Holy Spirit to begin to plant the opposite of that thing that was removed. If lust was removed, allow Him to plant a seed of purity through prayer in its place. If it was fear, ask Him to plant perfect love for, "perfect love casts out all fear" (1 John 4:18). If it's a weed of pride

pray for a seed of humility. Let the Holy Spirit lead you in this. Keep in mind that the corporate body is simply made up of individuals. So, what He's doing in us individually ultimately will manifest in us corporately as a church. As you feel led, begin to pray for the last of anything unhealthy to be removed by the root and for healthy, Godly seeds to be planted in their place here at Faith Chapel. I truly believe He will and the fruit we'll see in the years to come will greatly please the Lord.

Father's Day



The nation's first Father's Day was celebrated on June 19, 1910, in the state of Washington. However, it was not until 1972—58 years after President Woodrow Wilson made Mother's Day official—that the day honoring fathers became a nationwide holiday in the United States. Father's Day 2024 occurs on Sunday, June 16.

Origins of Father's Day

The campaign to celebrate the nation's fathers did not meet with the same enthusiasm—perhaps because, as one florist explained, "fathers haven't the same sentimental appeal that mothers have." On July 5, 1908, a West Virginia church sponsored the nation's first event explicitly in honor of fathers, a Sunday sermon in memory of the 362 men who had died in the previous

December's explosions at the Fairmont Coal Company mines in Monongah, but it was a one-time commemoration and not an annual holiday. The next year, a Spokane, <u>Washington</u>, woman named Sonora Smart Dodd, one of six children raised by a widower, tried to establish an official equivalent to Mother's Day for male parents. She went to local churches, the YMCA, shopkeepers.

and government officials to drum up support for her idea, and she was successful: Washington State celebrated the nation's first statewide Father's Day on June 19, 1910. Slowly, the holiday spread. In 1916, President Wilson honored the day by using telegraph signals to unfurl a flag in Spokane when he pressed a button in Washington, D.C. In 1924, President Calvin Coolidge urged state governments to observe Father's Day. Today, the day honoring fathers is celebrated in the United States on the third Sunday of June.

The Father God

"See what great love the Father has lavished on us. that we should be called children of God! And that is what we are! The reason the world does not know us is that it did not know Him" (1 John 3:1). This passage begins with a command: "See." John wants us to observe the manifestations of the Father's love. He has introduced the subject of God's love in the preceding chapter (1 John 2:5, 15), briefly discusses it here, and fully explains it in the fourth chapter. John's purpose is to describe the kind of love the Father gives His children, "what great love." The Greek word translated "what great" is found only six times in New Testament and always implies astonishment and admiration. What is interesting to note here is that John does not say, "The Father loves us." In doing so, he would be describing a condition. Instead, he tells us that the Father has "lavished" His love on us, and this, in turn, portrays an action and the extent of God's love. It is also interesting to note that John has chosen the word "Father" purposely. That word implies the father-child relationship. However, God did not become Father when He adopted us as children. God's fatherhood is eternal. He is eternally the Father of Jesus Christ, and through Jesus He is our Father. Through Jesus we receive the Father's love and are called "children of God."

Abba Father

It is likely that most Christians have heard God referred to as "Abba Father" throughout their lives: in prayers, at church, while reading the Bible in quiet time, etc. However, God's title of "Abba Father" is only found referenced in the Bible three separate times which are all in the New Testament. Only two speakers utter these words in these passages: Jesus and the apostle Paul.

Mark 14:36: "And He [Jesus] said, 'Abba Father, all things are possible for You. Take this cup away from Me; nevertheless, not what I will, but what You will."

Romans 8:15: "For you did not receive the spirit of bondage again to fear, but you received the Spirit of adoption by whom we cry out, 'Abba, Father."

Galatians 4:6: "And because you are sons, God has sent forth the Spirit of His Son into your hearts, crying out, 'Abba Father!"

So why would a title mentioned so sparingly in the Scriptures be so monumental in describing not only Jesus' and Paul's relationships with God but our relationship with God as well? This name of God is rich with meaning and implications for our lives. "Abba" is the defining term for father in the Aramaic language, spoken by Jesus and Paul as an intimate term to characterize their personal relationships with God. It is also a term of reverence for bishops and patriarchs within the Coptic, Syriac, and Ethiopian churches. The scripture from Mark is stated by Jesus, while the verses from Romans and Galatians are shared by Paul. Both had deep relationships with God that emerged in miraculous ways, and both met one another in a miraculous way. Hence, this would explain one reason why they would share the same intimate name for God that is not mentioned by any of Jesus' disciples or those found in the Old Testament. God sends His Spirit to live in the hearts of every one of his adopted sons and daughters. The Holy Spirit is referred to by Paul as the Spirit of His Son. He moves into our hearts and gives us the right, along with Jesus, to call out to God as a young child calls out to their "daddy." Abba means "father" in the Aramaic language. Because it's easy for young children to say, like the English term dada, it's what most young children would call their father. Without our own sinfulness and the law standing between us and God, we can live with God as little children do with a trusted father.

The cry of Abba Father is a cry of choice. It's addressing the Father of Creation and choosing to make Him our Father. Father, my Father.

Crying Abba Father is bowing the knee of our heart in devotion and submission to the one with the rightful authority of our souls trusting in his love — like Jesus.
